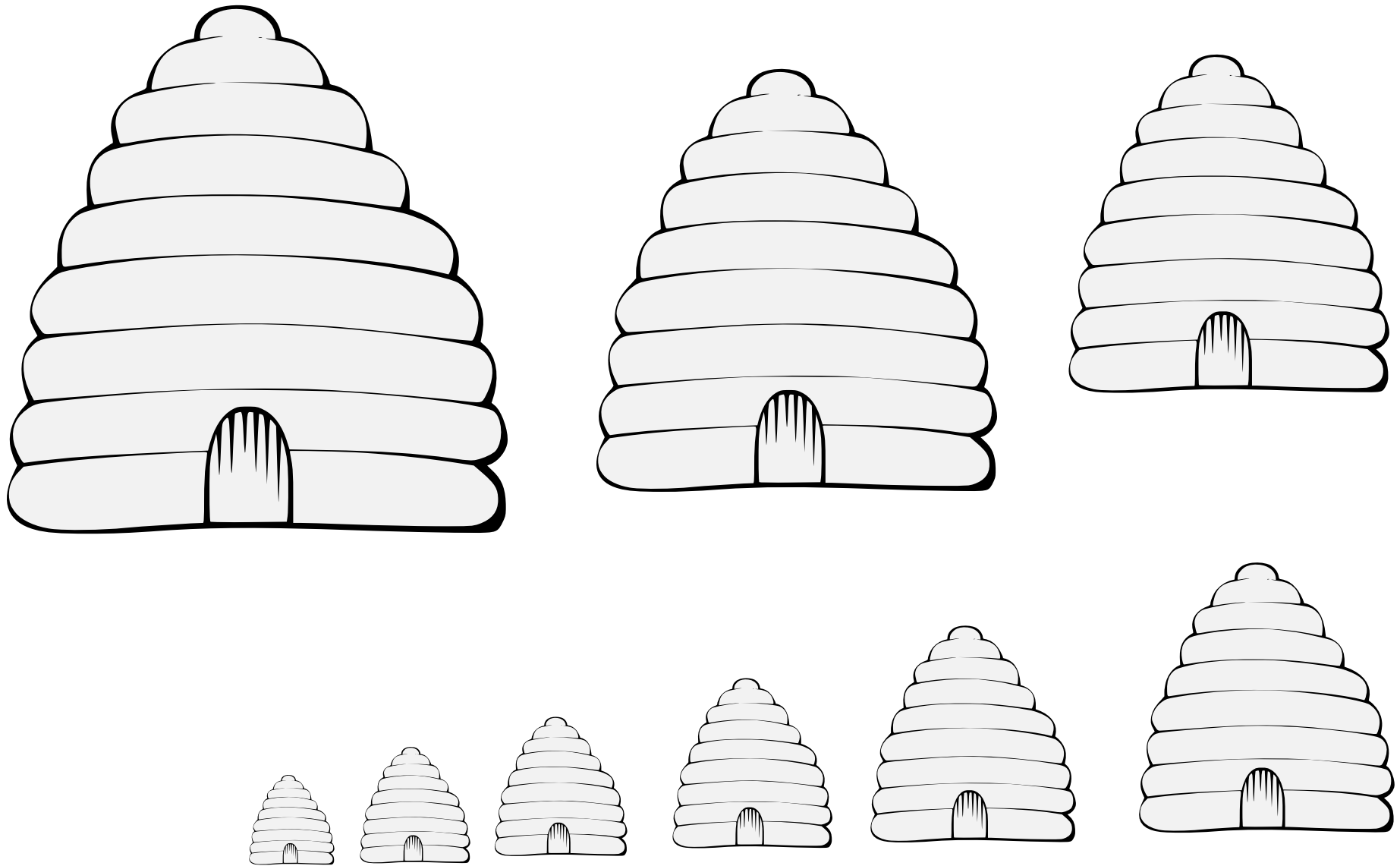

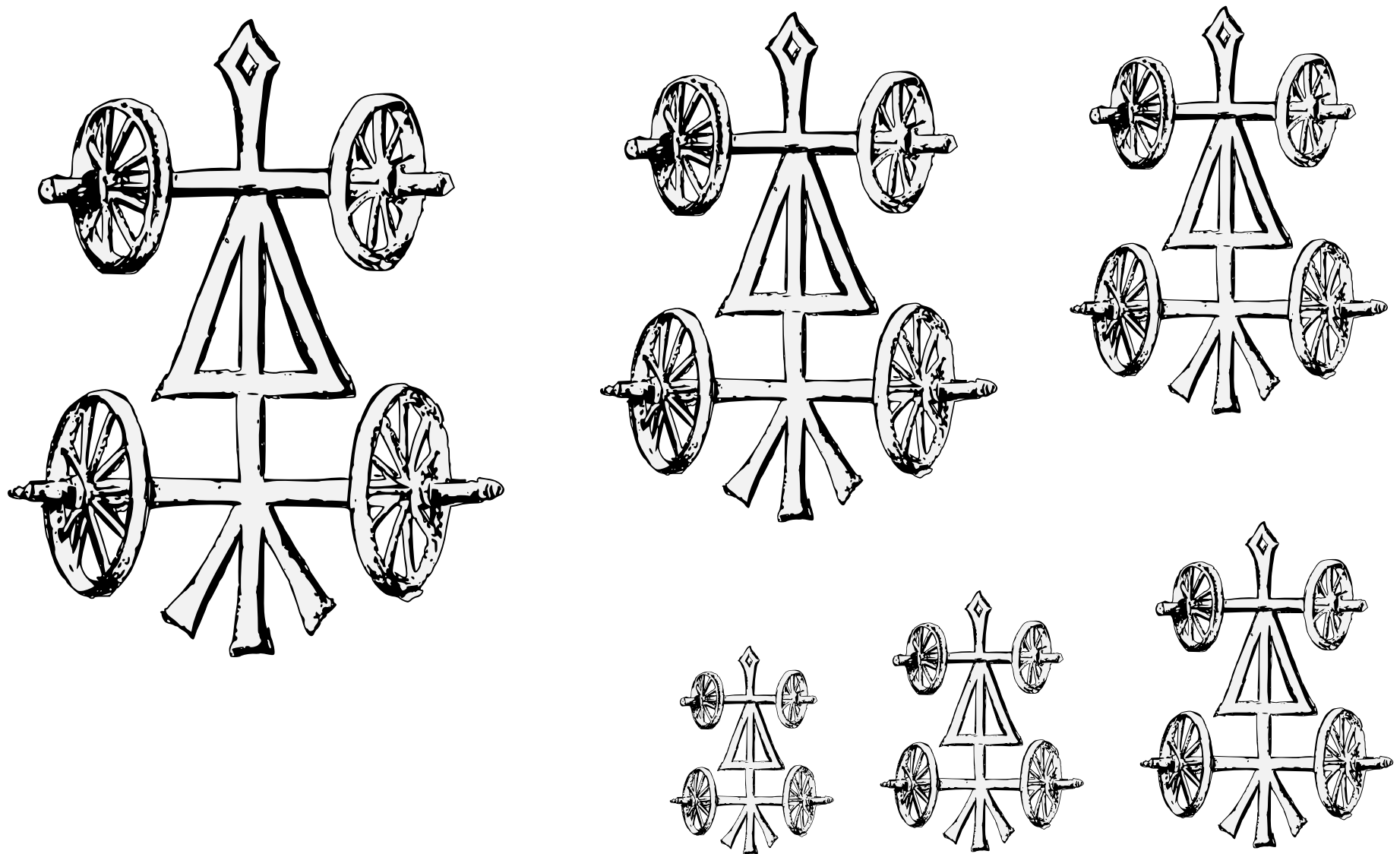


The wheels and connecting framework from the underside of a horse-drawn carriage

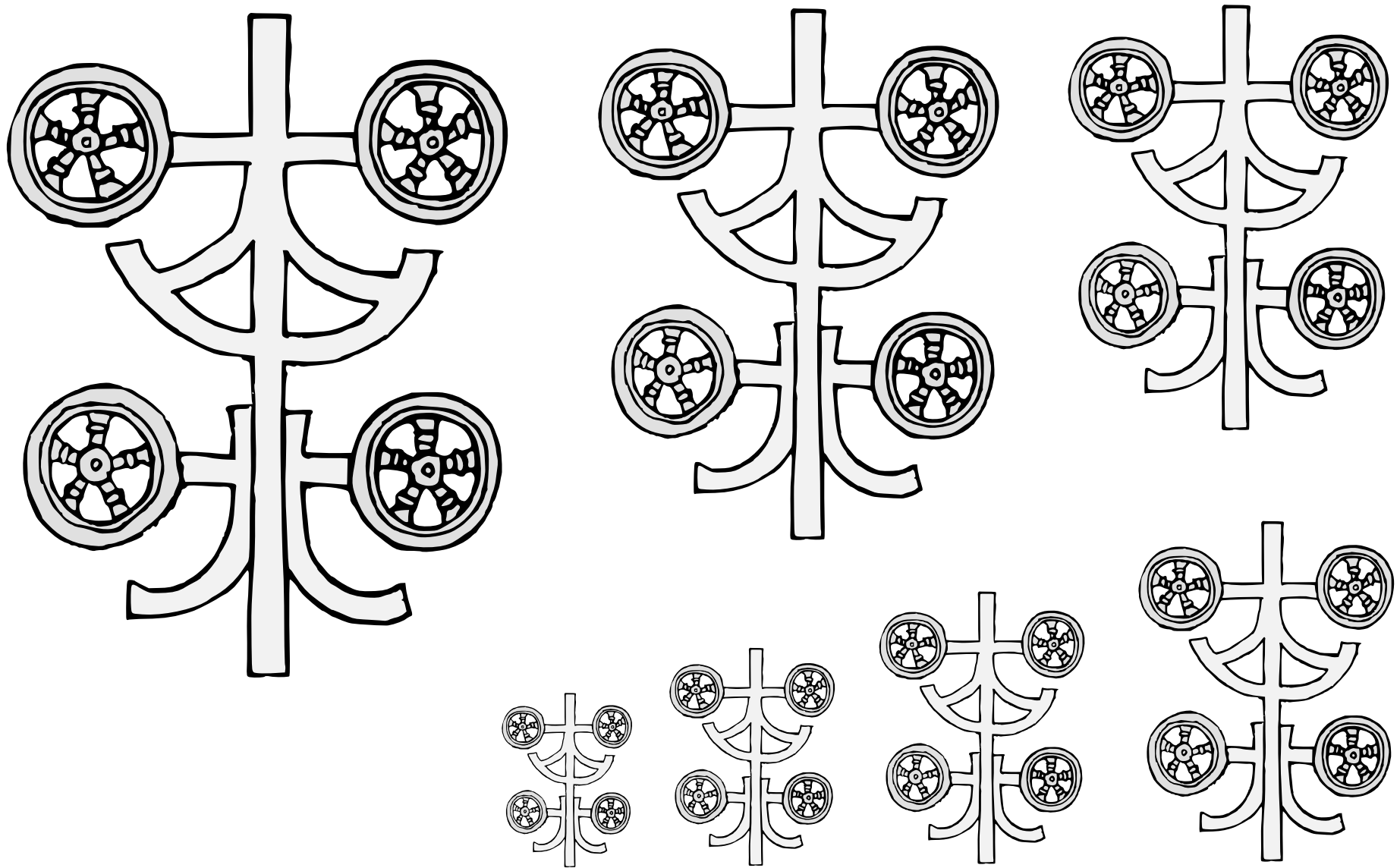

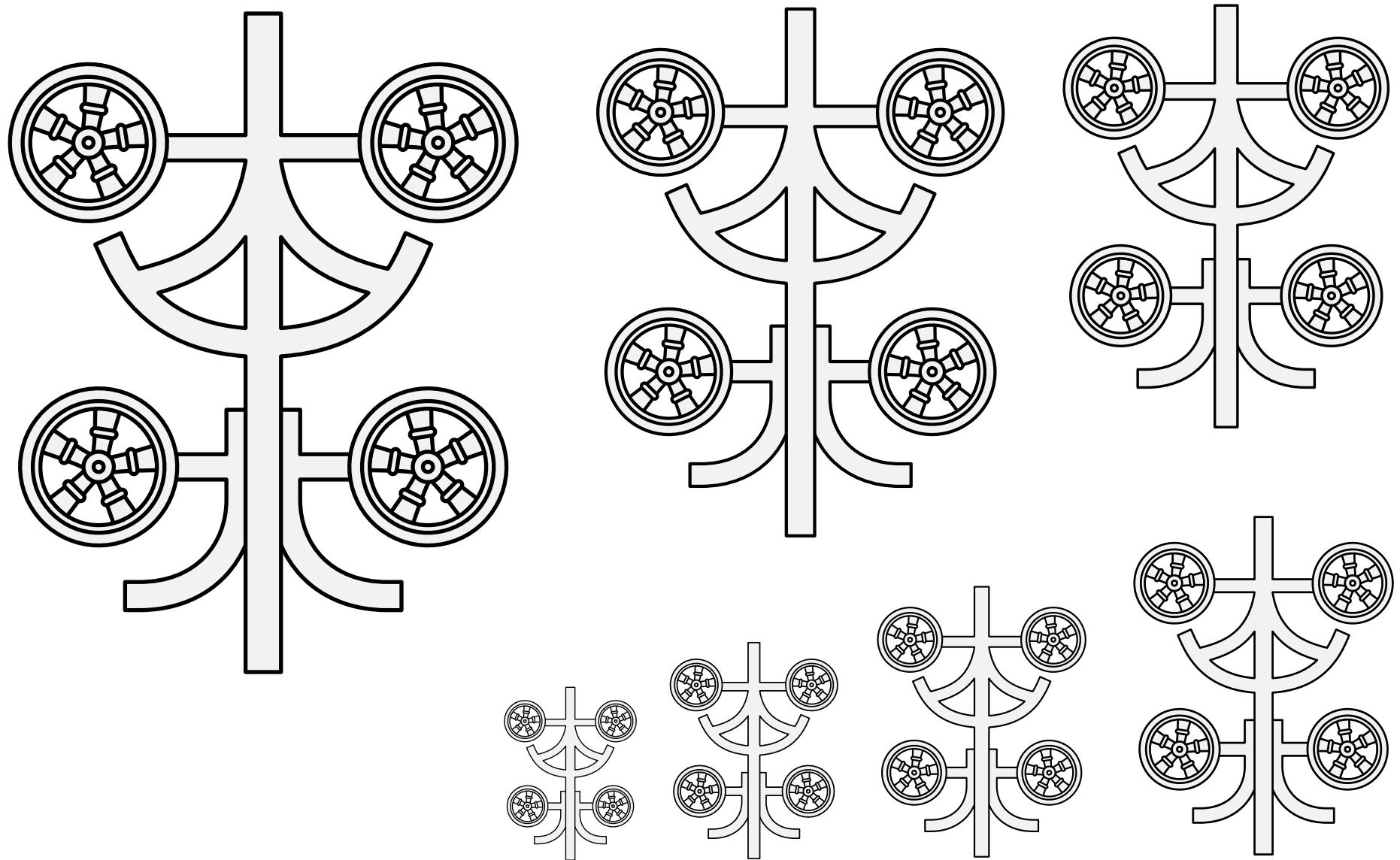


The wheels and connecting framework from the underside of a horse-drawn carriage.

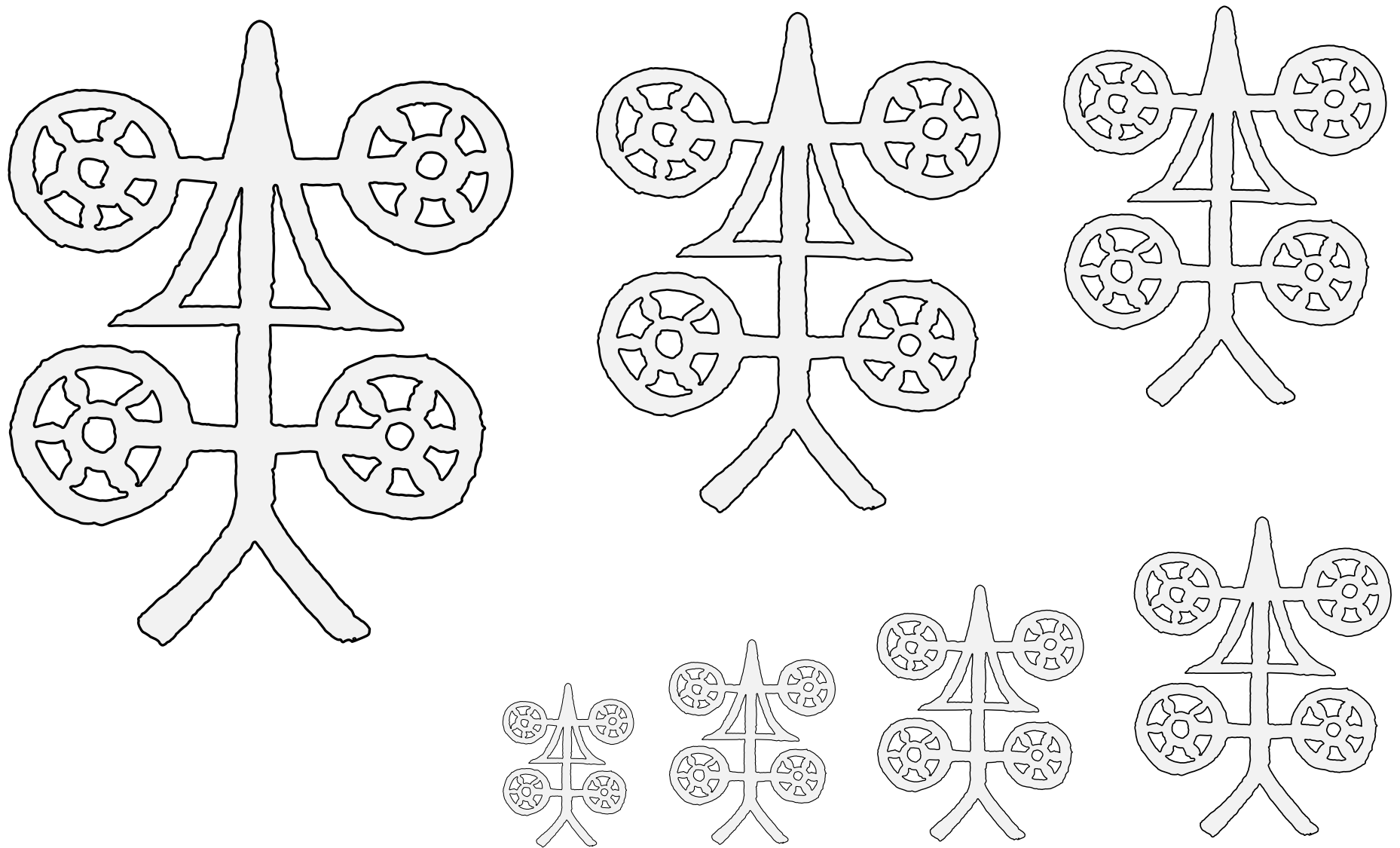


The wheels and connecting framework from the underside of a horse-drawn carriage.

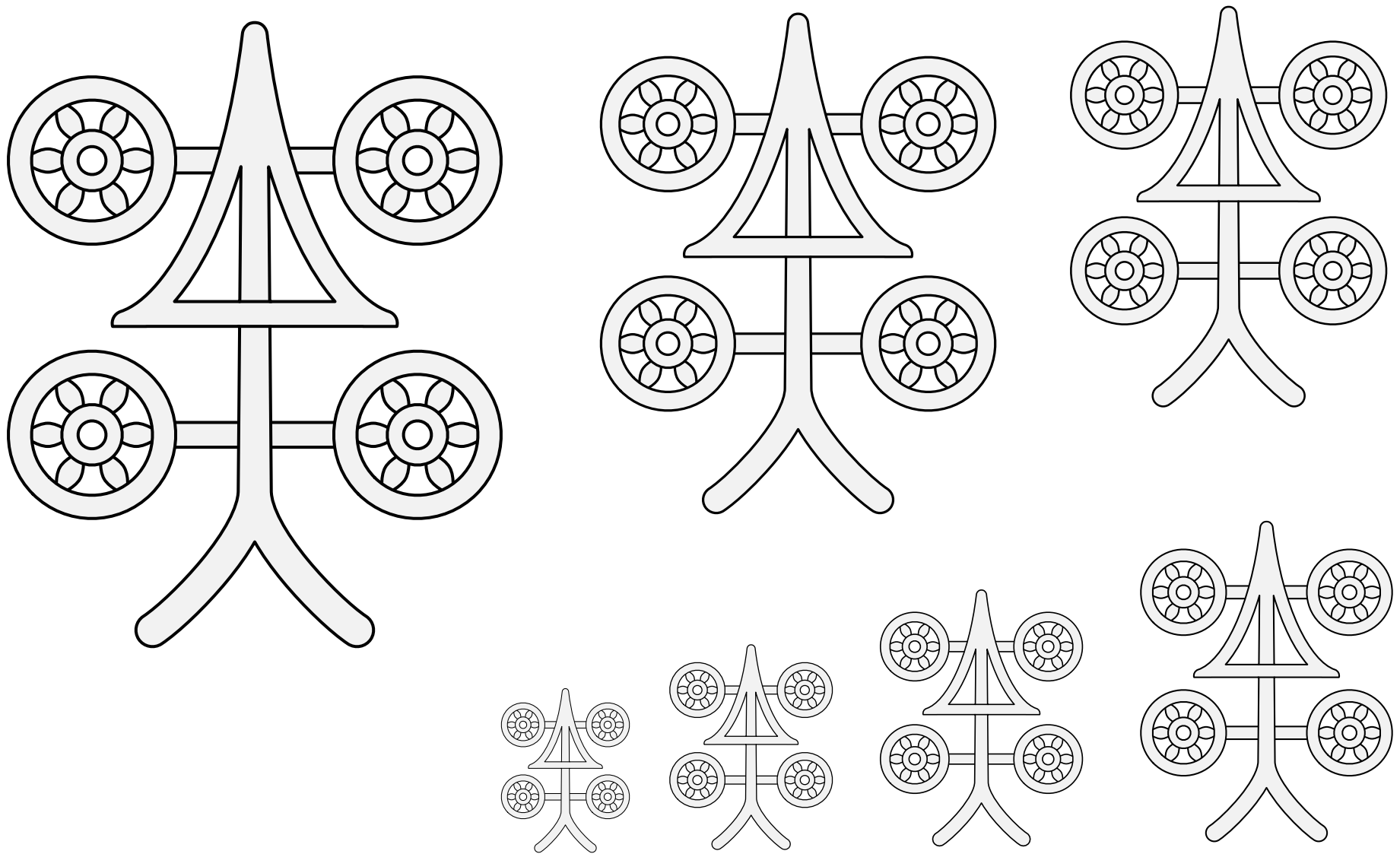


The wheels and connecting framework from the underside of a horse-drawn carriage.
